Flags installed for charity run for historic church renovation

Feather flags announcing the upcoming 5K Firecracker Run on July 4 were received by the Oakdale Historical Society and charity leaders this Saturday, April 16.

An incredibly windy day, the feather flags shook feverishly while on display.

The flags will eventually frame the start and finish lines at the gates in front of the Bourne Mansion.

All proceeds from the run will go towards the restoration/ replacement of St. John's (the second-oldest church in Suffolk County located in Oakdale) windows, which include original colonial period glass as well as stained glass from a Brooklyn church that are from France.

"Dave Chan, our race coordinator, has really taken the lead in this; under his direction we have really been taking step after step in making this spectacular," said MaryAnn Almes, president of the Oakdale Historical Society.

Sayville Running Company has signed on as official timers for the event in July. -Sam Desmond



\$9 million bond proposed to expand and renovate fire district buildings

Approximate tax increase is \$67 a year per household

On Tuesday, April 26, the community will vote on approving a \$9 million, 15-year bond for the Sayville Fire District.

With the fire district being able to cover about half of the bond and other grants, the burden to the taxpayer will be a tax increase around \$350,000 over a 15-year bond.

For an average household assessed at a \$42,000, it comes out to \$67 a year, which over a 15-year period will be \$1,005.

The last time a bond was presented to the community for the fire district was in 1995 to add two bays to Station 1. "The district has worked well to ensure that tax-

payers in the community have not been burdened over the years, as evidenced by not having a bond vote in 27 years, but this bond SAYVILLE is to finish and upgrade our two stations to be in line with safety and efficiency standards," said fire commissioner Mark Schmittzeh.

The bond vote of \$9 million includes the following renovations/updates:

Station 1

- · Renovating the hall and kitchen (last phase of 10-year renovation plan that has previously included upgrading the roof)
- Installation of lockers (for the decontamination room. To mitigate exposure to carcinogenic particles, it is recommended that firefighters shower within one hour of exposure. The fire district already has specialized wipes to give to firefighters after responding to a call with a fire to decontaminate, especially the neck and groin area where the carcinogenic particles have been proven to accumulate the most. Ideally, firefighters should shower and have their turnout gear washed immediately after responding to a fire. Having the lockers will allow firefighters to shower and change into sweatpants or other clothing to return home. Currently, there are two sets of washers and dryers: one set for personal clothes and one set for turnout gear)

Station 2

Installation of three bays, all north facing, still pulling out into Broadway. (Station 2 was built in 1984 and was designed for 25 members with a 27-foot rig. Today, the rigs are 32 feet to 34 feet with a ladder truck at 44 feet. The Sayville Fire





Teeth have stem cells!

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
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
MURIEL MEYER

She was very active for years at Our Lady of the Snow RC Church where she was awarded the St. Agnes Medal of Service.

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


Does having a seizure mean you have epilepsy?

OUR EXPERTS ANSWER YOUR QUESTIONS

Epilepsy and seizures affect more than three million Americans.

What's the difference between a seizure and epilepsy?

Dr. Mikell: Seizures happen when your nerve cells fire more rapidly and with less control than usual, affecting how you act or feel. These range from a brief sensory or motor abnormality to a full loss of consciousness with the potential for falling, shaking and difficulty breathing. Epilepsy refers to a brain disorder resulting in multiple seizures.

Does having a seizure mean you have epilepsy?

Dr. Spiegel: No, seizures are not always related to epilepsy. They can be a symptom of a disruption of brain function, such as from a high fever (in children), exposure to certain medications or substances as well as an electrolyte imbalance. Ten percent of Americans will experience a seizure at least once in their lifetime; the highest incidence occurring under the age of two and over the age of 65.

What causes epilepsy?

Dr. Spiegel: Epilepsy may be related to genetic factors that lead brain cells to misfire and can begin in infancy and childhood. However, in most cases, there is no clear genetic cause, and the seizures may be due to structural

abnormalities in the brain due to infections, brain, trauma, tumors or stroke, to name just a few examples. Sometimes, no clear cause is found on initial testing, and the neurologist has to look further.

How is epilepsy treated?

Dr. Spiegel: For most, anti-seizure drugs help control the seizures. Diet can also be a treatment for some, such as the ketogenic diet or a modified Atkins diet, when prescribed by a physician and carefully monitored by a dietitian.

Dr. Mikell: When anti-seizure medications and dietary modifications fail, surgery may be recommended for those whose seizures are associated with structural brain abnormalities, such as brain tumors, malformations of blood vessels and damage related to strokes. There are basically three types of seizure surgery — the surgical removal (resection) of the lesion that is causing the seizure, ablation (using heat to treat the lesion) and electronic modulation that delivers current to the brain before a seizure happens to control or reduce the seizure's effect. All of these surgeries can be performed at Stony Brook.

How controllable is epilepsy?

Dr. Mikell: Most people with epilepsy do very well when properly diagnosed and treated. Nationally, two out of three people with epilepsy can be expected to enter remission; that is, five or more years free of seizures while using medication.

What distinguishes Stony Brook's approach?

Dr. Spiegel: Stony Brook is a National Association of Epilepsy Centersdesignated Level 4 Epilepsy Center. This is the highest level an epilepsy center can attain. It means that an epilepsy center must have the professional expertise and facilities to provide the most advanced level of medical and surgical evaluation and treatment for patients with complex epilepsy. Patients who have persistent, recurrent seizures or those with an unconfirmed seizure diagnosis can benefit from the advanced services

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and technology we offer. This includes access to positron emission tomography/ magnetic resonance imaging of various types (PET/MRI), used to detect brain lesions that may not have been detected previously. Seizures and epilepsy can involve and affect multiple body systems, and having a team of specialists readily available helps achieve more effective treatment plans. Our team includes adult and pediatric epileptologists such as Dr. Louis Manganas, who is also Chief of Pediatric Neurology; neuropsychologists; radiologists; and neurosurgeons like Dr. Chuck Mikell and Dr. David Chesler, who are experts in the latest surgical techniques for epilepsy.

Our center also features 11-bed dedicated video-EEG epilepsy monitoring units with 24/7 observation staff and a portable video-EEG epilepsy monitoring system that can be set up anywhere in the hospital for patients who may be experiencing seizures. We also have a state-of-the-art neuro ICU with 10 EEG beds and one dedicated pediatric ICU bed. And our patients and their families benefit from clinical trials and our support and education services, including a nurse practitioner and a support group co-run by one of our physicians and a social worker.

Up to \$5,000 for businesses under Keep Islip Thriving

COVID-impacted businesses can apply for grant directly with Town of Islip

Local businesses (under 500 employees) and not-for-profit organizations within the Town of Islip may be eligible for relief grants (i.e. no repayment) from the town of up to \$5,000 in a new program called Keep Islip Thriving (KIT).

The initiative comes from monies received by the Town of Islip through the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) that was instituted as a response to financial devastation caused by the pandemic closures and mandates.

KIT, as it is administered by the town, is meant to be user-friendly towards the establishments by not requiring professional assistance to complete the appli-

'The ARPA process proved to be too onerous in its paperwork and we wanted to make our relief fund accessible to our community," said supervisor Angie Carpenter.

The Keep Islip Thriving fund opened to business owners and not-for-profits approximately two weeks ago and has already received a number of applica-

The town is planning to send letters to businesses and chambers of commerce to get the word out.

'We'll be knocking on doors to let peo-

ple know about this," said Carpenter. Currently, \$1.5 million has been allocated to Keep Islip Thriving, but the town can authorize more as it determines the response and needs from the Town of Islip community.

In the first wave of ARPA funds, \$457 million went directly to Suffolk County. Town of Islip, with approximately 330,000 residents, is the third most populous city in the state, but did not make the ARPA threshold of 500,000 to be allocated monies directly.

This second round of ARPA funds will give \$47 million over two years in two installments directly to the town. Categories for usage were intricately defined.

The application for KIT grants is available online and the completed application can be mailed back to the town.

The requirements for the grant include:

Business must be located within the Town of Islip and have at least two (2) years of business operating history.

Business must have no more than five-hundred (500) full-time equivalent employees.

Business must demonstrate an identifiable financial hardship as a result of COVID-19. Financial hardship must be documented, quantifiable, and clearly driven by COVID-19.

Business must be in good standing and current on its federal, state and local tax obligations and have no outstanding liens or judgments.

Business must be in good standing with the Town and have no outstanding Town Code violations.

Applicant must self-certify the eligi-

bility requirements and to the proposed use of funds on the application.

Eligible activities are defined as: "Activities eligible for funding must be a direct result of supporting public health and response activities associated with the COVID-19 pandem-

This includes:

Innovation to promote outdoor business to protect employee and public health.

Payroll/employee retention or supporting employees, including but not limited to Workers Comp Insurance premium and Unemployment Insurance premium increases related to COVID-19, employee paid leave due to COVID-19 illness.

Purchase of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) to protect employee and public health and efforts to sanitize the business environment.

Rent or mortgage payments (excluding property tax payments). • Addressing temporary COVID-19 related restrictions on business activity. • Increasing technology capacity to enable alternative work forms.

Creating new marketing campaigns or business plans. • Paying vendor invoices. • Facility cleaning/restoration.

Costs associated with additional training or virtual learning to implement COVID19 safety measures.

Expenses required to plan for a safe reopening such as expert assessments and/or to conduct research or market surveys.

The four-page application includes an entire page for a narrative to be submitted explaining the financial impacts of COVID on the business. ■

Owner Connor Vigliotta said of the earlier opening date (Flo's has traditionally opened Memorial Day weekend), "During the pandemic, we decided to open earlier because it

seemed the best for our customers, and we decided to keep that."

While staples of the Flo's menu have been kept, such as the standard burger on potato bread, there were some new, inventive items that were added for the discerning foodie.

The salmon sandwich features grilled salmon with pickled cucumber, avocado, and spicy mayo on toasted ciabatta bread. Light and reminiscent of island fare, the sandwich seems best enjoyed on a breezier night of gathering with friends around the ample, horseshoe seating of Flo's.

The shrimp tiger roll is shrimp tossed with mayonnaise, green onions, celery and chives on toasted potato bread, and had a bit of a "Japonaise-glaze" flair to it, with all the sushi elements but the rice. The punchiness of the delicate green onions and chives mixed with the refreshing snap of the celery is sure to be a summer favorite for the hottest of days.

Another new sandwich, albeit not sampled by our "epicurious" staff, is the decadent oysters Rockefeller special that includes fried oysters topped with creamed spinach and bacon on ciabatta bread. A nuanced, contemporary take on the surf and turf, this sandwich will hit all corners of the flavor palate.

Not hungry but want to sit and enjoy the sound of the bay and summer fun? Flo's has four batches of summer concoctions on tap with varied artisan ingredients. like lavender and rosemary with gin and vodka bases. Local beers are also on tap.

For the kids, there's simple ice cream delights and triple-thick shakes to enjoy the warm weather. ■

Controversial book under review

Gender and sexuality-focused book temporarily pulled from high school library

A book titled "Gender Queer: A Memoir," by nonbinary author Maia Kobabe, has come under fire in the Connetquot School District with parents asking administration to take the book out of circulation at Connetquot High School.


Since then, the district has provided the following statement: "As per Board of Education policy, if a piece of literature housed in one of our school libraries is challenged by a parent/guardian based on content, the selection is temporarily removed from circulation

pending review by a committee. CONNETQUOT Recently, the district received such a request for the book 'Gender Queer,' which is in the high school's Library Media Center's collection. The review process is currently ongoing."

Connetquot School District was asked how long the review process can take and what members of the administration and/or faculty were on the committee to review, but did not respond to Suffolk County News by time of print.

Jacquelyn DiLorenzo, a Bohemia native and current children's librarian at the Connetquot Public Library, who opposes the book's inclusion in the high school library said, "The book in question has mature content that shouldn't be made so available to minors. The content should be discussed with a parent or guardian before a child has access to it. A school library bypasses the step when there is parental input and the opportunity for meaningful dialogue about its contents.'

Jenna Murphy, a Ronkonkoma resident who is in favor of the book being available to students at the high school library, said, "There is no reason to remove any book from a library shelf. Removing 'Gen-

der Queer' should be no different. A school library, or any library, should be a place where any person can learn—learn anything, without judgment and without scorn or embarrassment. Nothing should be limited in a library and all libraries should be a safe place. My only wish is for anyone that wants to learn, can."

The book has come into the national spotlight as one of 2021's "most banned books" according to a report by NBC News, with its presence in schools being formally challenged in at least 11 states.

Gov. Greg Abbott (R-Texas) and Gov. Henry McMaster (R-South Carolina) referred to the book as "obscene" and "pornographic," both strongly questioning "[how the] books ended up on school shelves."

The book explores themes of identity and sexuality and has won awards from the American Library Association and the Young Adult Library Services Association (YALSA). The ALA's annual Alex Award recognizes 10 books that were originally written for adults, but reverberate strongly with teenagers and other youth readers.

Kobabe, who uses gender-neutral Spivak pronouns e, em and eir, has stated in interviews that the graphic novel (a term meant to describe a comic-book style, not an adjective for the content), which was published in 2019, is meant to be a guide on gender identity, coming out, the "trauma of being nonbinary in a society that largely sees gender as man or woman."

Most controversial about the graphic novel is a depiction of a character performing a sexual act on another character's mock genitalia. The section in question features a bird's-eye view and a side view of a sexual act in the panel. In another section of the graphic novel, the 14-year-old main character imagines a scene from Ancient Greece where an older man is depicted touching the genitalia of a seemingly much younger, masculine-presenting character.

Candidates collect signatures to qualify for ballot

Team notes transparency as unifying stance

On Saturday, April 16, four possible candidates for the four open board of education seats at Bayport-Blue Point

BAYPORT

School District set out to collect signatures from the community,

setting up a post at baseball fields on Bayport Commons.

Daniel Bertran, Elizabeth Cavuto, Amy Hope, and Jenna Kennedy greeted enthusiastic and curious community members leaving a baseball game and informed them of their intentions to run for the school board as a team.

In order to formally apply to be a candidate, potential candidates must collect at least 25 signatures from community members to make the ballot. The four candidates exceeded that number less than half an hour of being at the field

Cavuto, who ran last year, said of her impetus for running again, "I think it's important to give back to the community and I want to do what's best for our kids. That's still my motivation. We want to be a collaborative team of the district."

Kennedy said of her motivation to run, "My son is going to Sylvan this year as a kindergartener, and I would like to be an advocate for all children and a voice for all parents... These are precious years and [we all] want to be involved as much as possible."

Bertran said, "The school board is a challenging job and I think they can do better... [We] are strong proponents of parental choice and very interested in transparency... We want to know what they're [the school board] voting on, what curriculum that is discussed.'

When asked to expand on his definition on transparency, Bertran said, "When people ask questions, we'll give them that answer; we shouldn't stand by and say we don't discuss votes behind closed doors."

Some controversy later followed on social media, with community members upset that the event had not been advertised to more accessible community Face-

A resident of Bayport had posted the information about the signature gathering on a smaller community group approximately half an hour before it

Responding on behalf of all four candidates. Elizabeth Cavuto said. "The team used the Bayport Commons as a meeting place for those who expressed interest in signing our petitions. This was not an occasion to meet and/or question potential candidates, but simply to collect the required number of signatures necessary to submit our names as candidates. We look forward to getting out to meet as many community members as we can in the coming weeks." ■

All four candidates successfully submitted their applications to the district clerk on Monday, April 18, and will be on the ballot for

Roast pork with potatoes au gratin

BY DAVE ROGERS. 14-YEAR VETERAN WITH THE U.S. ARMY

As a kid, I loved going to my grandmother's house for Easter. Didn't so much enjoy the church service, but only because we had to wear our wool suits, and usually got new shoes which were basically hard leather wrapped around a piece of plywood, and with no time to break them in; it was usually the most uncomfortable three hours each year. My grandmother would start cooking the day before, and would get up early that morning to prep the food for the evening meal, which would consist of three to four meats, three to four vegetables, one to two starches, and a casserole or two. Don't worry—we won't cook all of that—it is enough for 10 people and a week of lunches for us kids.

For this episode, I will be cooking two of my favorite dishes from those meals. For this whole meal, I am going to be cooking in a pre-heated 375-degree heated oven.

Roast Pork:

I have made this before in a slow cooker, but I am going to do this in a one-pot-dish (cooking in my enamel lodge cast iron) for those looking for an easy-to-cook meal with little cleanup. As always, I am going to brine the meat in salt, pepper, white pepper, garlic, and let sit in the fridge for two to three

3 lb. roast pork

- 4 cups of broth (kind is on you, but since making brown gravy I will use beef broth)
- 3 cloves minced garlic
- ½ chopped onion



1 pack asparagus 1 pack baby carrots 1 tbsp olive oil 1/4 cup white wine (optional) Salt, crushed peppercorn, dried minced garlic A sprig of rosemary and thyme

I start by preheating my cast-iron pan, add my oil, onion and garlic, and sauté, being sure not to burn them. If I am using white wine, this is the time to add it. I then sear my pork roast in the pan, about 2-3 minutes on each side, until the outside has a nice golden-brown look to it. Remove from the heat, lift the roast pork and place the asparagus and baby carrots. Fill the pot with four cups of broth or until the roast pork is half covered. Top the roast pork with crushed sea salt, crushed peppercorn, and dried minced garlic. Add your thyme and rosemary, cover and place in oven at 375 degrees for 40-60 minutes, or until the roast pork is 140-170 degrees on the inside.

Au gratin potatoes:

This is a nice, creamy, cheesy meal. I have had it made easily with cream of chicken soup, or like I am making it here, more traditional.

- 4 russet or golden potatoes, sliced evenly (about 1/4 inch)
- 1 clove minced garlic
- 1/2 white onion diced
- 3 tbsp of butter (I am using garlic herb butter)
- 3 tbsp all-purpose flour Salt and pepper to taste
- 1 cup milk 1 cup heavy cream
- 1 ½ cups Gouda cheese
- 1 slice horseradish cheese (option-

I am again going to make this a onepot dish. I am going to make sure to cut the potatoes before starting, using my preheated lodge cast iron-pan, adding my olive oil and half my butter. Once the butter is melted, I am going to sauté the garlic and onion. Add in the flour and mix until it starts to turn brown. Add in your milk and heavy cream; if you want it creamier you can just use milk. If it becomes too thick, add more milk; too watery, add more flour. Remove from heat, toss in the potatoes, and stir until all the potatoes are covered. Place the shredded cheese on top, adding the horseradish cheese if you want a little kick, cover and stick in the oven (at 375 degrees) for 40 minutes or until the top is golden-brown and the potatoes are soft to a fork's touch.

District currently has 110 members, with 60 responding out of Station 2. Currently, there is a huge safety issue as firefighters have to gear up between the apparatuses and stop suiting up in order for the truck to pull out and are often hit with doors.)

Locker room (For similar reasons to the lockers in Station 1. For safety concerns and to mitigate exposure to carcinogenic particles, it is recommended that a hot and cold zone be created where firefighters can safely and efficiently decontaminate through showers and washing of their turnout

"Basically, Station 2 has reached the end of its life and to accommodate the expanded volunteer force we have now, we need to make these changes," said Schmittzeh.

The total bond of \$9 million, includes hard (e.g. the renovation of the kitchen and hall) and soft costs (e.g. tables, chairs, door locks), and the fire district started obtaining bids in March.

'We wanted to know the costs and didn't want to get caught with rising inflation that's going on now," said Schmittzeh.

A contingency budget was built into the proposal and Schmittzeh said, "we went heavy on that [contingency budget]."

All excess money will go back into the bond, which will lower taxes.

The fire district has also received a number of grants including a \$175,000 grant for new a new turnout gear washer, generator, and communications for Station 2. The 30-year-old generator at Station 2 would cost between \$10,000 to \$15,000 to fix, but the fire district applied for another \$150,000 to put solar panels on Station 2.

"That's it. For the next 20 years, nothing major needs to be done to these buildings," said Schmittzeh. ■

They went the extra mile

Michael's Auto Repair owner and brother retires

Oil changes, brake installations, engine overhauls, routine maintenance, and other necessities needed to make

a vehicle run well are SAYVILLE part of the daily norm at Michael's Auto Repair.

Michael Foschi started the Sayville business at 195 Middle Road in 1981; brother Anthony eventually joined him, manning the front counter.

But regulars knew if they were stranded when their car's tailpipe fell off, say, on Atlantic Avenue in Blue Point, they could call the busy Sayville office, get picked up quickly, as well as have their car towed. If the issue was miniscule, there was no charge. It was like that in a lot of different instances, including going to people's homes in rainstorms when the car wouldn't start; grateful recipients responded regularly with thank-you bagels and sandwiches.

The Foschi brothers are retiring, as is Bob Amendola, who also takes customer calls up front.

Chanpreet Singh, who owns Meineke Car Centers in Patchogue and Ronkonkoma as well as Maximum Auto in Port Jefferson, is the new owner of Michael's Auto Repair, who promises "everything remains the same, including current staff." And he will be there, he said.

It's one thing knowing your vehicle is in good hands, but part of the charm of coming to the Foschis was experiencing their dry sense of humor. It percolated like an impish undercurrent. Always polite, following up when promised, they might poke fun at your beloved boxer hanging out the car window as you drove by. It was a mix of that, photos of Anthony's four dogs on a corkboard, as well as those of the Virgin Mary. They took good

care of older moms who brought their cars in, too. "You're lucky to still have her," they'd say.

"We always tried to take care of our customers," said Michael. "I never saw the upside of cheating anyone."

Their customer base has always been local, mostly Sayville, Bayport, Blue Point, Bohemia. "Some will come from the North Fork or Babylon, but those are people who lived here and used us and then moved," Michael said.

Both men are Sayville High School graduates. Anthony graduated in 1973, Michael in 1975.

"I started working here in 11th and 12th grade," said Michael. "Back then, it was Don's Auto Repair. My father, Cesare, owned a nursery on China Road, 4 acres, so as teens we always got cars and beat the heck out of them driving on some of the nursery land."

Michael, in fact, wound up racing cars later on; he pulled out a photo of an orange Formula 1 he owned, as well as one of him standing with famous auto racing driver A.J. Foyt.

"Automotive was all we thought of," added Anthony. "We made a little racetrack and would put lawnmower engines

Anthony ran GE Capital Fleet Service in Farmingdale for 20 years. He started his own business, Fbls Inc., part of the Automotive & Repair Industry, in 1994, and is its president. "That's when I started to regularly come here and help out when I wasn't busy," he said.

The ramshackle building on the corner of Middle Road and Foster Avenue itself has history, starting out as a horseshoeing and fender repair in the late 1800s, then a 1940s car dealership. (Michael showed a 1981 Suffolk County News ad he wrote. "Sheila Rettaliata took the photo," he said. He even remembers his first customers, Richard and Bonnie Frank, who needed a master cylinder on



their Buick.)

The business started with four bays; two more were added in 2000. "We've had from five mechanics at one time to three, plus me working," Michael said.

They service about 26 different cars

daily. "Our phone is always ringing," said Anthony. It's true. Try every three to five minutes. (Applause to the mechanics. They rock.)

Michael, who lives in Bayport, will stick around and is leaning towards real estate. Anthony, who lived in Bohemia, already sold his house and was moving to the west coast of Florida, north of Tampa, where he's had a home for 15 years. Amendola, who lives in Shirley, who started out as a mechanic elsewhere and has been with Michael's Auto Repair for 21 years, will continue his hiking forays a bit more. "I'll maybe pick up my guitar again. I was in a small band-I was the fifth Beatle," he joked, "but we broke it up. I talked to my rhythm guitar player recently and we're talking about getting back again."

The three men have wives and families. They all said they would miss their clientele.

"Most of all, we took care of our customers like family," said Anthony. "Because we came from here and they were family to us." ■

'Stay' on NYS redistricting maps extended to April 20

Both parties will present to appeals judges

The redistricting fight in New York continues after a judge from upstate New York threw out the Democrat-created maps and passed congressional and legislative maps deeming them illegal because they favored Democrats due to gerrymandering.

Democrats asked for a stay for the current maps, but the back and forth will continue as the maps make

their way through the court system. The stay has been extended to April 20 by Justice Stephen K. Lindley of the Appellate Division. On April 20,

lawyers for both parties will be presenting to a panel of appeals judges. Republican candidates on Long Island are continuing their campaigns with the Democrat-drawn districts, including State Sen. Alexis Weik, who earlier this week announced that she accepted the Republican and Conservative Party nominations for New York's 4th Senate District after Republican Phil Boyle announced he would not be seeking reelection. Weik, who is from Savville, had her hometown moved into the 4th Senate District after the Democrat-led

redistricting process.

"Today, I proudly accepted the Republican and Conservative Party nominations to run in New York's 4th State Senate District," Weik said in a statement. "It is an honor and privilege to follow in the footsteps of Sen. Phil Boyle, who represented this area for decades and who has served as a trusted friend and mentor to me during my first term in the Senate. I will campaign hard for the privilege of representing the South Shore communities from Bayport to Massapequa and, while I have represented large areas of the district during my current term and while serving as an elected official in the Town of Islip prior to that, I look forward to meeting and listening to those residents in areas that will be new to me due to redistricting."

Running for the 3rd New York State Senate District on the Republican and Conservative lines, Weik's former district, will be former New York State assemblyman Dean Murray. Running on the Democratic line will be former New York State Sen. Monica Martinez. Martinez lost reelection in the 3rd District to Weik in 2020. ■

This month marks our 10th year in Sayville. These have been 10 of the most glorious years of my life. My husband, Mark, and I have shared many wonderful memories here and continue to do so in this magical hamlet by the Great South Bay. I recall our first glimpse of Sayville's charming Main Street as we drove down Montauk Highway after viewing a house for sale in neighboring Bayport.

We stopped the car in front of Top Hat's barber and while Mark got a haircut, I surveyed the shops. It was pretty much love at first sight. Over a delicious meal and a glass of wine at Cafe Joelle, we observed our picturesque town through the restaurant's large glass windows and imagined what it would be like to call this place home. We were a couple who sought a weekend retreat away from Manhattan and found Sayville to be most idyllic in terms of location and beauty.

Sayville is a small town with a tightknit community of loving and caring humans. One such human was realtor Caroline Sweezey, who found us the perfect home on Gillette Avenue.

With the help of Ms. Sweezey, we purchased a beautiful Victorian home built in 1905. At one point our home was known as The Alvin House—one of many hotels that proliferated in the area when Sayville first became a popular summer tourist destination in the late 1800s. Eventually a boarding house, The Alvin turned into an eyesore when it lost much of its grandeur and fell into disrepair. Fortunately, our home was gut-renovated, restored, and modernized by the previous owner. Of the 15 or so houses

we viewed, this home easily topped our list, and we moved in fairly quickly.

In the beginning, our time here was marked by long weekends where we relished the extra space in and out of the house. We threw parties and invited our new neighbors to introduce ourselves and get better acquainted with the locals.

Our greatest treasure undoubtedly has been our lovely neighbors, many of whom we now consider close friends. The Wartellas on our left live in a gorgeous landmark house built by Sayville's founding Edwards family. Husband Nick, a retired teacher and resident of 50 years, has been a wealth of local knowledge while his wife, Kathy, runs a thriving insurance business and is an accomplished baker who regularly drops off loaves fresh from the oven.

In fact, food goes up and down our street quite often. In the summer, the Mancuso's on our right share produce from their vegetable garden, while my mom's potato salad has been known to make its rounds during the Christmas season.



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
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Practice safe boating at all times

Boating is a recreational activity enjoyed by thousands of people. Spring and summer are prime times of year for boating, though people who live in temperate climates may be able to enjoy boating all year long.

Everyone who takes to the water, novices and experienced boaters included, should be familiar with boating safety guidelines. In fact, it is a good idea to take a boating safety course prior to boating for the first time or as a refresher if it has been a while since reviewing the rules of the

Boating safety goes beyond learning basic operation and navigation. Safety guidelines also involve getting a vessel safety check. The U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary offers complimentary boating examinations. They can verify the presence and condition of safety equipment required by federal and state organizations. Boaters also may be able to conduct virtual vessel exams. This means boat owners can perform a self-inspection of the boats based on digital prompts. People who reside in Canada can contact the Office of Boating Safety to confirm whether vessel checks are required and how to get one. Licensure and registration of boats are part of responsible boat ownership both in the U.S. and Canada.

Along with boating inspections and water rules, some other ways to stay safe involve educating oneself of the larger dangers on the water. These generally involve risky boater behavior, such as failing to wear a life jacket or having an inadequate number of life jackets for passengers. Alcohol use while boating also can be problematic. Being under the influence can adversely affect boaters' reaction times and decision-making abilities. According to the 2018 U.S. Coast Guard Recreational Boating Statistics Report, alcohol continued to be the leading known contributing factor in fatal boating accidents in 2018, accounting for 100 deaths (19 percent) of total fatalities. Curbing alcohol use while boating can help avoid accidents and deaths.

Excessive speeds also can derail nice days on the water. The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department says that, although there are no numerical speed limits on the water, excessive speed can cause accidents in crowded areas. Speeding makes it difficult to react to obstacles including underwater wildlife — and bring the boat to a stop within a safe distance of others.

Boating season is heating up, and that means making safety a big part of operating and enjoying a vessel.



Protecting and Enhancing Long Island's Environment

It's been 52 years since the first Earth Day. The good news is that the air that fills our lungs, the land upon which we live, and the water that surrounds us are much cleaner today than in 1970. The bad news is that there are serious challenges ahead. Today, our ground water is threatened, climate change is happening, and government is idly watching as a waste crisis blankets Long Island.

On Earth Day and every day, we should reflect on our own habits and focus on the things that we can do to reduce our footprint and protect Long Island's air, land and water. It's time to acknowledge how much waste we produce as a society and do something to ensure pollution is properly managed.

We should take no comfort that our biggest export off of Long Island is garbage. Nor should we be proud that millions of pounds of waste are burned on Long Island every day. The carbon emissions that belches from smoke stacks both day and night is contributing to climate change while the black, toxic ash left behind is an unwelcome reminder of society's consumption.

As is the case with most big problems, no one entity can solve it alone, but if we all take action, we can make progress together. It will not be easy and it will not be cheap. But, protecting and enhancing Long Island's environment is worth it!

Prepare for spring planting

The final weeks of winter, and even the first few weeks of spring, are still chilly in many parts of the world. Despite those last vestiges of winter chills, late winter is a great time to begin preparing gardens for the coming planting season.

Gardens may have to withstand months of harsh weather each winter, and such conditions can take a toll. Gardeners can consider the following tips as they try to restore their gardens and get them ready for spring planting.

Thoroughly disinfecting such tools prior to using them in the spring is a great way to reduce the risk of disease in your

· Clear debris from garden beds. Leaves, twigs, sticks, and other debris

may have gathered in the garden over the winter. Such debris can inhibit the growth of plants and vegetables, so make sure all of it is removed prior to planting. Weeds might even begin to sprout up in late winter and early spring, so remove them before they go to seed.

• Test the soil. Testing the soil prior to planting can help gardeners determine what their gardens will need to thrive in the coming months. Garden centers and home improvement stores sell home testing kits that are effective and easy to use. Once the results are in, speak with a professional at your local garden center about the best time to amend the soil.

· Loosen compacted soil. Soil can become compacted over winter. If compacted soil is not loosened prior to planting, plants will have a hard time getting the water and nutrients they need to thrive. Loosening the soil also provides another opportunity to inspect the garden for any underlying issues, such as fungi or weed growth, that you may have missed when clearing debris or testing the soil.

Beginner's guide to kayaking

Although it's not absolutely necessary, it's recommended that novices take paddling lessons to hone their kayaking skills. Learning the proper technique can help people avoid strain on their neck and back and safeguard their arms from fatigue.

Novices should practice on calm waters until their technique is honed. Lakes are a great place to learn, as rivers and places with mild currents can overwhelm those new to the sport.

One of the easiest ways to get introduced to kayaking is to go with an experienced paddler or tour company. Such companies charge a set price for an excursion that will provide transportation to the drop site as well as the equipment needed for the voyage. Tours may include travel down several miles of a relatively calm waterway, allowing novice kayakers to get a feel for paddling and take in the scenery.

Getting in and out of a kayak can be challenging for beginners. The resource Kayakpaddling.net offers helpful illustrations and animated tutorials about entering and exiting kayaks as well as paddling techniques and safety.

Kayakers should bring some essentials along. A dry pack can keep electronics, food and equipment dry. Remember to wear sunscreen and a hat to keep safe from the sun. A life vest also is essential.

Exercise, fresh air and enjoying the open water are just some of the many draws of kayaking.

How to pick the right trees for your property

Trees benefit a landscape by serving both aesthetic and utilitarian functions. A home surrounded by healthy green trees can be a sight to behold, and those same trees can benefit surrounding plants and wildlife at the same time.

As appealing as trees are, not all trees and landscapes make for the perfect match. The Arbor Day Foundation notes the importance of planning when designing a landscape. Careful consideration of a handful of variables can help homeowners determine which trees will make the best fit for their properties.

- · Height: Homeowners must consider the projected height of a tree before planting it. Avoid trees that will bump into anything when fully grown, as that can adversely affect surrounding greenery and pose a safety hazard. The ADF's tree sizing guide can be accessed at https://www.arborday.org/ trees/rightTreeAndPlace/size.cfm and serves as an invaluable resource for homeowners who want to plant new trees around their properties.
- Canopy spread: Trees grow out as well as up, so it's important to consider their potential width at maturity as well. The ADF sizing guide can help

homeowners get an idea of how wide a tree is likely to be at maturity. Trees that spread out quite a bit don't necessarily need to be avoided, but it's important that they're planted far enough apart so they don't adversely affect surrounding plants. In addition, wide trees that are planted too close together can make the landscape appear crowded, taking something away from its aesthetic appeal.

Growth rate: Growth rate is an important variable because it can affect how quickly homeowners will see changes in their landscapes. Homeowners who want to plant for privacy can consider trees with quick growth rates or purchase more mature trees that are already near full growth. Those who are not in need of instant transformation can try trees with slower growth rates, which the ADF notes typically live longer than fast-growing species.

· Requirements: Different trees require different amounts of sun and moisture and different soil components to thrive. Homeowners can have their soil tested to determine which trees will thrive in it. Local garden centers can be a great resource for homeowners who want insight as to which trees will thrive in their local climates.

Trees serve many functions on a property. Choosing the right trees for a landscape requires careful consideration of a host of variables.

How to corral spring allergies

Spring is synonymous with rebirth. Each spring, flowers begin to bloom again, grass starts to grow and people from all walks of life rekindle their love affair with the great outdoors. Spring also marks the return of a familiar foe:

Seasonal allergies can put a damper on even the most welcoming spring day. Thankfully, it's possible for seasonal allergy sufferers to have their spring and enjoy it, too.

- Pay attention to seasonal allergy trackers. Seasonal allergies are now easier to track than ever. For example, Pollen. com is an easily accessible and free site that allows visitors to type in their ZIP codes and access daily allergy reports for their towns and cities. Visitors also can see five-day forecasts that can help them plan trips and other outdoor excursions. Weather.com also offers free allergy reports and forecasts. Individuals with seasonal allergies can make use of these sites and plan their activities based on the information they provide.
- Stay indoors when allergen levels are especially high. The Mayo Clinic notes that there are several things individuals can do to reduce their exposure to seasonal allergy triggers. That includes staying indoors on dry, windy days. This doesn't mean individuals need to lock themselves indoors all spring. But it's important that seasonal allergy sufferers recognize that

some days might be too much to handle. Rain helps clear pollen from the air, so individuals who are avoiding the outdoors on days when pollen counts are high should be able to get outside after a good rain without triggering an attack.

- · Maintain clean air indoors. The great outdoors is not the only place where allergens percolate. The Asthma and Allergy Foundation of America notes that improving air quality in a home can reduce allergy triggers. Air conditioners can prevent outdoor allergens from entering a home, so utilize units on warm spring days when you might otherwise open the windows. Open windows and screen doors provide easy entry points for allergens like pollen, so turning on the AC when outdoor allergen counts are high can make seasonal allergies more manageable.
- · Consider treatments. Over-thecounter treatments like antihistamines, nasal sprays and decongestants provide most individuals with sufficient relief from their seasonal allergies. If OTC remedies are ineffective, treatments such as allergen immunotherapy and a consultation with an allergen may be necessary.

Seasonal allergies can spoil an otherwise welcoming spring day. But there are many ways for individuals to corral their seasonal allergies and still enjoy spring sun.

The buzz about bees

Warm weather and extra hours of sunlight spark flowering trees and plants to bloom anew. This is the time of year when the air is sweet with the aroma of blossoms and the familiar hum of insects can be heard all around.

Not all "bugs" are the same this time of year. While you probably won't want ants invading your backyard grill fest, the presence of bees nearby can be a good thing — even if those curious yellow-and-black critters get a little close for comfort from time to time. That's because almost 90 percent of wild plants and 75 percent of the leading global crops depend on animal pollination, indicates the World Wildlife Federation.

Bees are remarkable creatures in small packages. The following are some bee facts to buzz about, courtesy of the WWF, Save the Bees™, NASA, and the Texas A&M University Honey Bee Information Site.

- There are roughly 20,000 species of bees around the world. Most of them are solitary bees.
- Bees have five eyes. Two of the eyes are large compound eyes with hexagonal facets. The other three are small, simple eyes.
- · Honeybees have a move called the "waggle dance." It is a clever way of communicating to tell them where to go to find the best sources of food.
 - · Bees can carry up to 122 times their

body weight in pollen and nectar.

- · Bumblebees leave footprint scents behind. They are able to distinguish between their own scents, the scent of a relative and the scent of a stranger as they look for food. They also can avoid flowers already visited.
- Should a queen bee perish, the hive workers will select a new young larva and feed it a special food called "roval iellv." The larva will develop into a fertile queen.
- Bees flap their wings 190 to 200 times per second. They can fly up to 15 miles
- Female bees can sting; males do not. Losing the singer will cause the bee to die. The honeybee only can sting once because its stinger is barbed. Bumblebees and hornets can sting multiple times because they have smooth stingers.
- It can require nectar from two million flowers to make one pound of honey.
- Many bees are not aggressive. Simply moving away from them can prevent a person from being stung. Generally, bumblebees and honey bees will only sting by accident or if a nest is being disrupted.
- Wasps are different from bees in that they are mostly known to be predators. They eat other insects and often food that people eat, which is why wasps are more likely to be found around your cookout. Bees tend to be covered in hair, while wasps (which include yellow jackets) are smooth.



A decorated resume in his 20-plus-year tenure

Coach Doller celebrates 200th win

For over two decades, Christian Doller has been the chairman of the Board for Sayville varsity boys lacrosse. Doller has been a physical education teacher at Sayville High School ever since.

'As I look back now, I would have to say I'm most proud of the fact that I took on the challenge

SAYVILLE while I was student teaching in 1998 to start the boys program with the help of a handful of community members," said

1998 and prior to the new millennium had plans on depositing the foundation for a lacrosse squad that hailed from Brook Street in West Sayville. 2001 was the inaugural season for the Purple and Gold, and it was not long until the program was configured into a mainstay Suffolk County contender year after year, which has made an annual policy of making a run for a county championship. The past two decades, the bystanders of the Sayville community have beheld in awe of teams that consisted of offensive juggernauts and tenacious defense. Doller put in the hard work every day after school in daily enactments of perfecting quality repetition teaching skills to the varsity lettermen.

Arduous practices were held begin-

ning in the frigid February days to the dog days of summer in the blistering June heat. The brotherhood these young men have bonded through the years has meshed (no pun intended) with traditional winning ways of the team. Coach Doller's mastermind of the sport, along with his benevolence and benignity of putting his players first before anything, has proliferated into all the attainments with not only trophies, but also the athletes learning life lessons that they have grasped and will for a lifetime.

Coach Doller has a decorated resume in his 20-plus-year tenure at the helm of marshaling his teams' wielding of laced sticks on grass at Greene Avenue. Configuring the lacrosse club in 1998 and being the head coach since the team's inception in 2001, he has obtained much team opulence, such as countless division championships, coached over 60 all-county lacrosse players, and over 100 players from Doller's teams have played collegiate lacrosse. Coach Doller's first win came in 2001 against East Hampton, and that was just the first to proliferate an illustrious journey. In 2009 and 2012. both seasons concluded in hardware. In only the ninth season of the program, Savville lacrosse became champions: 2009 Long Island Champions, as the team had a commanding 15-6 record defeating Shoreham-Wading River in the Suffolk semifinals, 9-8: Smithtown West 11-9 in the Suffolk County Title game; and Garden City 12-10 in the Long Island Championship at Stony Brook. In the Suffolk

County victory against Smithtown West, Coach Doller reached the century mark on the win tally, as that was his 100th win in his career.

The immaculate season came to a close in a loss to Niskayuna in the state semifinal game upstate in Middletown, N.Y. Another indelible season came in 2012 as Sayville won the school's second Suffolk County Championship. The Purple and Gold's record was a remarkable 12-5.

Sayville vanquished Eastport-South Manor 14-11 in the Suffolk County semifinals, then overwhelmed Comsewogue 12-5 at LaValle Stadium at Stony Brook University to win Sayville's second county championship in a span of four years. At halftime in the county title game, the Golden Flashes led by a slim 4-3 mar-

gin. The high-powered offense poured it on with eight second half goals, culminating in a 12-5 victory with another trophy and more smiles and grins from the

Sayville community. The boisterous win earned Sayville another trip to the Long Island Championship held at Shuart Stadium at Hofstra University, but Sayville fell to Garden City 9-2.


In 2018, the Golden Flashes had another memorable season, making another trip to the Suffolk County finals. In the first round of the 2018 Suffolk County playoffs. Savville's brawny offense put on an offensive clinic scoring 15 goals and outlasting Shoreham-Wading River 15-14, advancing to the semifinals. Doller has multifarious personal coaching attainments he has garnered in his long tenure. Doller has been named Suffolk County Coach of the Year five times, was awarded the prestigious honor in 2012 of being named United States Lacrosse NILA Coach of the Year, and thrice was bestowed the glory of North/South Suffolk All-Star Coach on three occasions.

On March 24, Coach Doller's personal success and team success came full circle as he joined an elite club. Sayville Boys lacrosse defeated Sachem North 8-7 on the road, and that was Doller's 200th career win. All the hard work and lifelong dedication has compensated in fulfilling meritorious accolades with

Matt Messina, 2005 Sayville alumnus, former varsity lacrosse player and close friend of Doller, had many kind words

'Christian Doller is a staple in the community and has touched the lives of a tremendous amount of kids and families. He has gone above and beyond in his free time to help families both in sports and in just everyday life where families needed assistance. He is a physical education teacher in the high school, where he is still loved by every student that crosses paths with him," Messina said. "He often doesn't get the recognition that nany feel that he deserves in lacrosse rich Long Island, and it's mainly because he keeps a low profile. He has sent tons of kids to some of the best college programs in the country and has had players go on to play professionally as well."

'Coach Doller started the program and built it up into a nationally known program, where you can go to any lacrosse tournament and ask about Sayville lacrosse and they'll know about it. He is a players' coach and only cares about mentoring the players that come through the program and coaching them

into hardworking winners. He runs clinics all year round for the youth league and runs camps in the summer. He has come to the aid of families in need of help over a multitude of things and has never asked for anything in return or for himself. His former players will attest to the life lessons he instills in his own unique way. He has a genuine care for his players that extends after graduation and beyond the field. The Sayville community has been lucky to have Coach Doller. Congrats on 200plus," added Doug Meehan, 2009 Sayville alumnus, former Sayville lacrosse player, current Bayport-Blue Point lacrosse coach and close friend of Doller.

"I'm also very honored to have coached so many great kids that have gone on and become wonderful men, husbands, fathers, and coaches as well. We spend hundreds of hours with our kids during and outside of the season. This time is not only spent on X's and O's, but I'd like to think I have an integral positive influence on them as they move forward in life. I hope they understand the benefits of having a solid work ethic, the importance of goal setting and possibly most importantly, forming lasting relationships with your teammates and coaches," Dollar said. "There doesn't have to be any friction between players and coaches. I've always believed I could get more out of them on the field by first developing a positive relationship. Once your players know this, they can honestly accomplish anything together." ■

Earth Day isn't only one day a year

On beaches and in parks, green spaces and backyards across Long Island-and around the worldcountless friends and neighbors came together last week to mark the annual Spring celebration known as Earth Day. Started in 1970, Earth Day is time of reflection, and also action, on ways every individual can make a difference both in your neighborhood and for our planet.

But caring for our environment isn't just a one-day concern. I'm looking forward to joining with volunteers in another South Shore tradition of sprucing up one of our favorite local green spaces, on Saturday, May 7th, at the Bayard Cutting Arboretum State Park in Great River.

Starting at 9 a.m., we'll work to remove litter and winter damage to help ready the park for nearly a half million visitors expected this year. All are welcome!

But whether it's the Arboretum or any of New York's more than 200 other state parks and outdoor attractions, we're always seeking ways to protect our open spaces. This year, that included passage of an historic environmental bond act.

More than ever, following two years of pandemic lockdowns, New Yorkers are seeking to reconnect with outdoor spaces, and the bond act, which is subject to voter approval this fall, would fund improvements to our parks, trails and beaches, preserve open spaces, clean up toxic former industrial sites and more.

Here on Long Island, funds from the bond act and a newly expanded state Environmental Protection Fund can be used for critical infrastructure to harden our beaches against storms and erosion and protect our sole source drinking water supply.

Water quality issues are always foremost on my mind. A recent survey found worrying concentrations of chemicals in some of the more than 50,000 private wells that serve homeowners in Suffolk County. I'm drafting legislation that will help homeowners find and pay for regular testing to ensure that their drinking water is safe.

Whether it's writing legislation to help ensure clean drinking water for the next generation, volunteering a few hours to help with our May 7th cleanup at Bayard Cutting Arboretum (or at your favorite park or beach), or just taking steps to make your backyard a little more "environmentally friendly," there's something everyone can do to mark Earth Day—every day.

"The community has to understand that people affected with autism are here and working with their challenges. They persevere and it is up to us to raise awareness and engage in advocacy for them," said Piccirillo.







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
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
